Respiratory Syncytial Virus

A highly contagious illness that causes infection of the lungs and breathing passages.



- Fever
- · Severe cough
- Wheezing and rapid breathing or difficulty breathing



Droplet Transmission

RSV is spread through droplets from coughs and sneezes.

Droplets transferred from:

- · Hard surfaces (i.e. doorknobs)
- Clothing
- Skin-to-skin contact

Population Most At-Risk

Infants and young babies are severely affected by RSV. RSV infections typically occur in epidemics, often occurring in daycares.





Steps to Prevent RSV

Prevention efforts parents can take include:

- Hand washing
- Keep sick children home
- Monthly injection (children especially at-risk)

Call Doctor...

Contact your provider if your child starts displaying the following:

- High fever
- Wheezing or seems to be working harder to breathe
- Decreased activity
- Prolonged illness
- Retracting of ribs


Kids younger than 5 are at higher risk of developing serious flu-related

PCI Daily Health Observation

A daily health check of each child is made upon arrival in the parent or caregiver's presence. To prevent the spread of infection, communication between teachers and parents about the child's health status is vital to identify any specific signs or symptoms of illness. Children with any symptoms of illness will not be allowed to remain in the center:

- Temperature over 100 degrees
- An unexplained rash
- Vomiting (in the past 24 hours)
- Diarrhea (in the past 24 hours)
- Thick, green drainage from the nose
- Discharge from the eyes
- Lice
- A contagious disease (ex. Chickenpox)

The Child Tax Credit: What Head Start Families Need to Know... In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the American Rescue Plan provides historic investments in children and families, including the largest ever Child Tax Credit. There's money on the table for Head Start families — \$3,600 for children under six, to be exact.

What You Need to Know


The American Rescue Plan raised the maximum Child Tax Credit in 2021 to \$3,600 for qualifying children under the age of 6 and to \$3,000 per child for qualifying children between ages 6 and 17, or up to \$300 per month and up to \$250 per month, respectively. Before 2021, the credit was worth up to \$2,000 per eligible child and 17-year-olds did not qualify for the credit. It's critical that families make sure they have filed taxes. As a provision of the American Rescue Plan, this change to the Child Tax Credit is not permanent. Decision makers in Washington would like to keep this increase in years to come, but will not be able to do so without demonstrated interest from families.

What You Need to Do

If you've filed tax returns for 2019 or 2020, or if you signed up to receive a stimulus check from the Internal Revenue Service, you will get this tax relief automatically. If you did not file taxes in 2020 or 2019, which may be the case for some income-eligible Head Start families, you are still eligible. You must use the Child Tax Credit Non-filer Sign-up Tool to enroll.

Carefully check your mail for anything from the IRS and encourage friends and neighbors to do the same. The IRS is mailing letters to non-filer households in the upcoming weeks to ensure families are aware of the steps they need to take to start receiving

the increased benefit.

Health Services Advisory Committee

All Head Start and Early Head Start programs are required to establish and maintain a Health Services Advisory Committee (HSAC) to support children's healthy development. The HSAC is an advisory group usually composed of local health providers who represent a wide variety of local social services agencies. They may include pediatricians, nurses, nurse practitioners, dentists, nutritionists, and mental health providers. Head Start staff and parents also serve on the HSAC. Effective partnerships are key to the success of this approach. HSACs help programs to make decisions about health services and strengthen the communities where Head Start families live.
